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High risk areas to be monitored



The KwaZulu-Natal Utrecht team responded to a call of a fire at Emlwane Farm on 16 July. The team fought the fire for almost four hours before it was finally suppressed. According to the team's Base Communication Representative, Zamani Nkosi, the fire was the second the team had responded to since the start of the fire season.

The cause of the fire is still unknown and the team plans to keep a close eye on high fire risk areas.

Limpopo firefighters battle first major wildfire in province

Firefighters in Limpopo were dispatched to fight a wildfire that was threatening the Department of Agriculture Forestry and Fisheries (DAFF) plantations in Soekmekaar as well as the neighbouring farms. The fire started on Friday, 22 July 2016, outside the DAFF plantation and jumped into the nearby plantations.

"Our ground and aerial resources battled these fires in the plantations. I want to thank the Letaba Fire Protection Association for availing their resources to contain the fire," said Sam Maepa, the General Manager for Working on Fire in Limpopo.

Nelson Nemukula, Deputy Director-Commercial Forestry at DAFF, told WOFire News: "We worked very closely with the WOF firefighters as well as the farmers from the surrounding areas and that contributed to the fire being suppressed before the further damage was caused. We lost about 300ha due to the fire."



We are currently in the midst of the winter fire season and have seen quite a reduction in fires compared to the same period in previous years.

A number of factors have contributed to the significant drop in fires thus far this season.

We have seen much better preparedness through the various partnerships between local authorities, land owners, Fire Protection Associations and community members. Through our engagement with these sectors there has been a much more vigilant implementation of our Integrated Fire Management plans. Fire prevention measures put in place included prescribed burning, fuel load reduction, community fire awareness campaigns and early warning detection systems.

From our perspective, the partnerships between landowners, FPAs and local fire authorities have worked well this year and, with the recent launch by the Minister of Agriculture of the National Veld and Forest Fire Working Group, a lot more will now be done to ensure compliance with the provisions of the National Veld and Forest Fire Act.

The rain experienced in some of our northern provinces, while welcomed by our farming communities, does create conditions conducive to increased fuel loads, which could pose a fire risk later on during the drier winter months. I want to urge our firefighters to remain vigilant throughout these next few months and to stay safe on the fire line.

Let me also thank all our participants and management for their contributions during the recent Mandela Day activities. I am profoundly proud of the fact that in all our provinces we contributed to 'living the Madiba legacy' by doing various community-related activities.

Eastern Free State teams do their part to prevent unwanted fires

The Eastern Free State was hit hard by fires in previous fire seasons which has resulted in teams going the extra mile to prevent such fires. The Bethlehem, Golden Gate and Clarens teams are conducting daily fire prevention activities, including constructing firebreaks and doing fuel reduction. The aims of these activities are to prevent runaway fires from damaging property and to protect the environment by limiting the spread of these fires.



Working on Fire partners with Municipality to reduce fires

After responding to a shack fire near their base, the Modimolle participants took it upon themselves to bring about change in the community.

Working on Fire, together with Modimolle Municipality, embarked on a door-to-door fire awareness campaign at the Phagameng informal settlement in Modimolle. The objective was to educate community members about the impact of fire and how they could prevent shack fires and protect their homes.

Since the start of the fire season, the Modimolle Team has responded to two shack fires in Phagameng informal settlement. At the first fire that occurred at the beginning of June, the firefighters and a community member rescued two children between the ages of four and six years. The second fire was reported just a week after the first. In both incidents, the WOF participants were alerted by the unusual smoke they saw coming from the informal settlement.

"As Working on Fire, our key objective is to save lives and to protect the environment. We might be the veld and forest firefighters but if there's a fire taking place near us we will always respond and assist where we can irrespective of the type of fire," says Letters Lehutso, a Type 1 Crew Leader at Modimolle Base.

More than 13 shack fires were reported to the municipality since the start of the fire season.

Upon investigation it was discovered that almost all the fires were caused by negligence. This prompted WOF to join hands with the municipality to prevent more fires.

"We have been fortunate so far that no lives were lost in all the shack fires that have been reported. We managed to visit about 55 households in Phagameng in one day to distribute the message of fire awareness to the communities. We will continue to educate them about the fires until we get to zero fires in this community," says Sarah Skosana, Disaster Management Officer at Waterberg District Municipality.

During the door-to-door campaign community members were given the emergency numbers to call to report shack fires. Residents can call Waterberg Disaster Management Control Room at 0800 111 660 or Modimolle Fire Department at 082 807 8152. Both numbers are manned by 24-hour operators.

"I am grateful for the assistance that the WOF firefighters gave me when they rescued my shack which was burning. May they keep up the good work," says community member Cecilia Ngoepe.

Tsholofelo Moumakwa, a BCR from Castello Base, says they have created firebreaks and have done block burns over the



past weeks in the central region to assist landowners to comply with the Veld and Forest Fire Act

Working on Fire participants from the Nebo Team are working hard to ensure that the stakeholders from their area are FireSafe during this winter fire season.


When they are not doing fire awareness education at the schools and in the communities, the Nebo Team is helping landowners to prepare for the winter fire season. As part of the preparations, they created fire belts, firebreaks and block burns, and did manual fuel load reduction.

One of their Integrated Fire Management projects was to ensure that St Rita's Hospital was FireSafe and compliant with the Veld and Forest Fire Act. They created firebreaks for the hospital and educated hospital employees on how to identify fire risks at their homes and how to prevent fires.

"We are working hard to prevent veld and forest fires and this year we believe that the number of fires in our area will drop significantly," says Katlego Thipe, the Base Communications Representative of Nebo.

The team has been working closely with the Department of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries to create fire belts at the nearby plantation and also to remove unwanted fuel around the plantation.

Since the start of the fire season, no fires have been reported in their area, which shows the fire awareness education the team has provided is helping.

Eastern Cape

The Eastern Cape Communication Cluster trained 33 firefighters from the province to become Base Communications Representatives (BCRs). These young men and women will serve as links between management and their bases.

The training took place in Langeni in the East region and Van Stadens in the West region, from 26 to 30 June. As in other provinces, the BCRs were equipped with writing, presentation, photography and social media skills. They were also taught to capture and update statistics at base level on a database and how to conduct school and community fire awareness activities.

One of the BCRs from the Joe Gqabi Team, Asanda Mbonyana, said after the training that she feels ready to use the skills obtained from the training.

"Even before I became a BCR I loved taking pictures of our activities at the base and

presenting when we conducted fire awareness, so the training has developed me and given me more knowledge," explained Asanda. She also thanked WOF for developing their skills above and beyond firefighting.

The BCRs were also assessed to ensure that they understood what they were taught and were able to implement what they were trained on in their work.

The Fire Awareness Training Officer, Zola Hans, said that the BCRs also conducted doorto-door awareness in the area near the training venue to strengthen their presentation skills.

The GOM from the West region, Mxoli Cabela, wished all the BCRs the best and assured them of the full support of the Eastern Cape management.



North West

The North West Communications Cluster hosted a Base Communications Representatives (BCR) training event at Boskop Dam Nature Reserve from 27 to 30 June.

The 18 participants who attended and completed the three days of training will be the direct communication and awareness links between the Communications Cluster and bases. Information regarding events, awareness and resources will feed down from the Communication Cluster to the bases and vice versa.

After the presentation session, the BCRs did a door-to-door practical and assessments to ensure they understood what they learned.

The objective of the training was to develop effective communication at base level by equipping BCRs with writing, presentationand photography skills. They were also trained in coordinating schools and community-based fire awareness activities, capturing statistics at base level and updating and maintaining the base profile.

One of the BCRs, Lesego Lekote, says, "I would like to thank Working on Fire and the Communications Cluster for the opportunity they gave us, the inspiration, motivation and



everything they taught us. I am now inspired and can't wait to go back to the base and start writing as I have always longed for it."

The Fire Awareness Training Officer, Sophy Dinko, says, "The training went well and we are glad we have managed to equip the participants with the necessary skills in how to conduct themselves when they go out to communities."



Firefighting skills used effectively

at Blouberg

A 28-year-old crew leader, Agalelang Matubako of Molopo Base in the North West, is using her firefighting skills to help with fire management at her grandfather's farm.

"Fires used to burn huge hectares of grassing land and my grandfather's livestock were at risk of being burned. It was after acquiring firefighting skills from Working on Fire that I was able to help my grandfather reduce fire risks in the farm," Matubako says.

"As the Working on Fire team we do fuel load reduction in different areas by slashing grass. We then keep the slashed grass as livestock feed for farmers in the area. Before becoming a firefighter I never thought of managing the ecosystem on the farm," she explains.

She says that slashed grass helped her grandfather and other farmers to mitigate drought crisis in the area. "That is why we advised farmers to keep the slashed grass as feed," she says.

Matubako says that the skills she got from Working on Fire made her pay attention to environmental issues and to contribute to making sure the environment is protected.

"We do fire breaks which help limit the spread of fire and fire awareness for the farmers in the area," she says.



Beating the odds

"I took a risk when I went to the recruitment process, despite being an epileptic sufferer, and I passed all the fitness tests and got the job. I initially didn't disclose that I was epileptic because I was scared I might be excluded from the recruitment," says Isaac Mahlangu, who works as a Store Person for the Roodeplaat Team.

"I travelled close to 200 km from Siyabuswa in Mpumalanga to be recruited at Roodeplaat. I needed this job," he says, remarking that job opportunities in the rural areas were so scarce he was forced


to depend on his grandmother's old age pension grant. He says that he only disclosed his sickness before going for medical assessments. He was then offered a position of a Store Person

'Now I am proud that I can make a living for myself. I can now buy things I need without asking for my granny's assistance and I am also able to help my grandmother financially," Mahlangu says.

"After matriculating I came back home. Then I went to Port Elizabeth where I worked part-time at two different places," Booysen explains.


He says life was difficult until he joined developed to take on different positions and was able to afford his two daughters' education.


'Early this year I applied at ECPTA and this month Anele and I were told that we got the jobs as field rangers and will start at the end of July," he says.
