



Just over 200 delegates attended the official opening of the Western Cape wildfire season at the Lourensford Wine Estate, Somerset West, on 28 November 2018, which was held under the auspices of the Western Cape Umbrella Fire Protection Association.

Anton Bredell, the Minister of Local Government, Environmental Affairs and Development Planning in the Western Cape, said that the province was ready for the fire season. He said, "We have access to eight helicopters, four water bombers and eight spotter command and control aircraft that can be deployed to incidents across the province.

"These aerial resources will be complemented by 1,550 municipal firefighters across the province, bolstered by approximately 1,020 seasonal firefighters (municipal and other organisations). There are also 27 Working on Fire teams with about 700 firefighters in the Western Cape and an additional 500 firefighters in other provinces who can be called upon if required."

The official opening of the fire season also coincided with the hosting of the first major Wildfire Ready Convention in the Western Cape at the same venue, from 28 to 29 November 2018.

This two-day convention focused on targeting wildfires in the Wildland-Urban Interface (WUI) and presentations were made by several speakers from the USA and Europe, local fire authorities and fire protection associations.

Attendees discussed how - through Integrated Fire Management and its four operational components of reduc-



tion, readiness, response and recovery, and linked to the Wildland-Urban Interface as the distinct focus – fire authorities could concentrate not only on how to fight these fires, but also share best practices for the prevention and mitigation of wildfire events.



2018 marks the centenary of the birth of Nelson Mandela and this provided a unique opportunity for people around the world to reflect on his life and times and to promote his legacy.

In 2003, Nelson Mandela said, "Our children are our future and one of our basic responsibilities is to take care of them in the best and most compassionate manner possible."

In October, we attended the Presidential Job Summit hosted by President Cyril Ramaphosa which adopted a declaration calling for the expansion of the government's public works programme.

During this year, many former firefighters moved on to the formal job sector, to jobs at the South African Police Service, nature conservation agencies and at local fire brigade services. This is a trend that we want to increase exponentially in the years to come.

In support of the call to create more work opportunities for our youth, we will further develop the skill sets of our firefighters in 2019 to help them move into the formal employment sector, and in so doing, create more opportunities for other unemployed youth to become part of the programme.

#### Winter Fire Season

We had a slight reduction in the fires which Working on Fire responded to in the 2018 winter fire season (1,819) compared to the 2017 winter fire season (1,963).



This can largely be attributed to much better preparation by landowners and communities, and in this regard, I want to thank all our firefighters and management in our winter fire season provinces for doing all the hard work in terms of firebreaks, fuel load reduction and prescribed burning.





#### World AIDS Day marked in the Western Cape

To mark the 30th anniversary of the first World AIDS Day in 1988 we remember the lives so sadly lost to the virus and reflect on the journey of those facing challenges every day.

This World AIDS Day, activist Nompumelelo Ngangane, a former WOF firefighter who is now a Human Resources Assistant, spoke at a WOF Western Cape event about her experiences.

Ngangane, a mother of three beautiful children, said, "Not many may know but I've been living with HIV for the past 16 years, and it has not stopped me from living my dreams. In the beginning, it was very challenging, as many people would reject me when they heard about it. It was difficult in the beginning but

I grew strong and started sharing my story so that other people couldn't hurt me anymore and spread rumours about me."

Although ending HIV transmission is within sight, the HIV stigma unfortunately still exists. A survey revealed that half (50%) of people living with HIV have experienced discrimination because of their HIV status.

Following the event, which was initiated by SDP Colleen Jones, the Western Cape provincial staff released balloons in memory of those who lost their lives to the HIV/AIDS virus.

Many stakeholders attended the event and provided motivational talks, such as the Department of Health, SASSA, Mangaung Fire and Rescue, EMS, businesses, various church denominations and the community at large. Most participants got the opportunity to be tested for HIV, TB, high blood pressure and diabetes.

Social Development Practitioner Selaelo Mathokwane says, "Our teams across the province annually join the international community in showing support for the drive to reduce the spread of HIV/AIDS within the country. By forming part of these events, they aim to inform society that the fight against HIV/AIDS is in the hands of each individual."



## Let us all help to fight HIV/AIDS

Social Development Practitioner Sabelo Buthelezi says the firefighters and management need to be encouraged to do HIV/AIDS tests.

He says testing is seen as a serious step in the right direction towards confronting what is a global killer disease that remains an enemy to the health of young people and which threatens the future of this country.

Because millions die from the disease, Buthelezi says, "We cannot afford to turn a blind eye on this deadly virus and syndrome," and adds that firefighters are not immune to AIDS and should be tested.

Johannes Motsepe, a Crew Leader for the Ditholo Team, says it is critical that everybody join hands to fight the scourge of HIV. It is through testing that people can then get help and treatment.

Buthelezi says creating awareness and educating employees about the disease is the key to fighting the disease



as firefighters' health and wellness are the central focus of the programme.

## No to violence and abuse

The Krugersdorp Team participated in a march against women and children abuse to City Hall attended by stakeholders from across the public service in the West Rand.

Social Development Practitioner for WOF in Gauteng, Sabelo Buthelezi, says that violence against women and children was at alarming proportions.

"It is running like a raging wildfire. It has to be curbed as a matter of urgency," he says.

## Eastern Cape firefighters applauded for battling Tsitsikamma and Olifantsvlakte fires

Stakeholders in the Koukamma Municipality have expressed their appreciation of the Working on Fire firefighters and the hard work and dedication they showed during the Tsitsikamma and Olifantsvlakte fires.

Senior Section Ranger of SAN-Parks, Euginia Mkhatshwa, said these young men and women did a wonderful job.

The Tsitsikamma fire started on 23 October in the Lottering area in the west and was declared contained on 27 October. A second series of fires started due to lightning between Stormsriver and Clarkson on 29 October. Fire suppression activities over this period were hampered by extreme weather conditions, exacerbated by further lightning fires on 4 November at Coldstream and Kareedouw.

This fire spread over 80 kilometres from Coldstream in the west to Palmietvlei in the east. Working on Fire firefighters worked very hard for almost two weeks and finally succeeded in containing the fire on 7 November.

The total area affected by this fire between the catchment and the coast was approximately 40 000 ha of which the burn scar is approximately 6 000

The Olifantsvlakte fire started on 4 November while the Tsitsikamma battle was still raging, when lightning struck on the mountain peak to the north of Coldstream and fire then spread down in a southerly direction. As there was no immediate risk, monitoring was done daily while all resources were based in Witelsbos to assist with the fires in Tsitsikamma

When the Tsitsikamma fire was totally contained, monitoring of the Olifantsvlakte fire continued until 10 November when suppression activities started, as the fire was becoming a threat due to wind changes alternating between easterly and westerly directions.
